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

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SOUL LINK RETREAT On Being Mediocre Mystics: Claiming Our Spiritual Identity

The term "mediocre mystic" qualifies as an oxymoron, a contradiction. How can one be "so, so" and yet have attained the spiritual heights that the word 'mystic' implies? The derivation of 'mediocre' has to do with being half way up a mountain. We don't have to arrive at the top of our spiritual journey to be in communion with God, for that reality, however understood, is at the bottom (where we aren't even aware there is a journey), the middle (wherever we happen to be on the climb), as well as at the top (which may only be experienced fully when we die). We are mediocre, we are unfinished, we are a work in progress, we are half way up the mountain - if that far. But while this is true, it is also the case that we are always one with the One who is the source and satisfaction of our deepest longings.

Our retreat will offer the opportunity to consider our status as "mediocre mystics," to hear from and about the journey each of us is on, and about how we deal with the ups and downs that come with knowing that we have "arrived" at the same time that we are only "half way up the mountain."

From A Room Called Remember by Frederick Buechner

"We are all of us more mystics than we believe or choose to believe... We have seen more than we let on, even to ourselves. Through some moment of beauty or pain, some subtle turning of our lives, we catch glimmers at least of what the saints are blinded by, only then, unlike the saints, we tend to go on as though nothing has happened. To go on as though something has happened, even though we are not sure what it was or just where we are supposed to go with it, is to enter the dimension of life that religion is a word for."

When Buechner uses the word religion he is not referring to institutionalized sects with their doctrines, worship, and rules of behavior, but to the root meaning of 'religion' which, from the Latin *re ligare*, means to re-bind. And when he says that we are all mystics, he is not talking about our being saint-like; rather, he is asserting that we are all capable of sensing the sacred, be it in beauty or pain. When, by allowing ourselves to be smitten by the "glimmers" outside of ourselves, we are reconnecting with the sacred within, to our mystical core, to our soul.

BOOKS FOR THE JOURNEY

The Mystic Heart by Wayne Teasdale (New World Library)

This rare and wonderful book awakens readers to their own mystic nature. We discover here how previously divided spiritual traditions are converging into a new river of holiness, an interspirituality. What is unique in this work is the luminous guidance the author gives us for deepening one's personal faith while exploring the mystical genius of other traditions.

Flunking Sainthood by Jana Reiss (Paraclete Press)

This memoir tackles twelve spiritual practices in a quest to become more saintly. Reiss begins with great plans for success but finds to her growing humiliation that she is failing. What emerges is a funny yet vulnerable story of her quest for spiritual perfection, and the reality of spiritual failure which turns out to be a valuable practice in and of itself.

The Awakening Call by James Finley (Ave Maria Press)

This lucid and beautifully written guide to Eastern meditation provides Westerners with a method of learning the skills of mindfulness — of being awake and fully aware. The author's gentle anecdotes and practical exercises focus the reader's attention on breathing and show that the contexts for being mindful are numerous and close a hand – washing the dishes, answering the phone, drinking tea. His compassionate spirit and the method of meditation described here will help both beginners and advanced students arrive at greater self-understanding and peacefulness.
